# LEADING WITH CARE POLICY at St. Andrew's Church October 2015

This fall we will take another step towards compliance of health and safety standards as mandated by the Presbyterian Church in Canada. We will practice safe evacuation of the building in the form of a fire drill.

Each room has a designated exit. When the "alarm" is sounded, then the following procedures need to be followed:

- Parents of infants are to go to the Nursery to assist the person in charge.
- A point person will notify the two downstairs Church school classes and lead the children outside in an orderly fashion to the back parking lot, far from the building. Parents will meet their children there.
- People in the sanctuary need to exit by the nearest door to the outside. Greeters at the narthex doors may assist as facilitators.
- The elevator will not be in use. Assistance needs to be given to those with canes, walkers or wheelchairs.
- An assigned person needs to check the washrooms on both levels.
- A review of any issues or concerns will be conducted after the practice drill and addressed. Changes and clarifications will be communicated to the congregation. Please express your observations to us so that we can improve our efficiency if necessary. Thank you.

# CHURCH SCHOOL REPORT FOR OCTOBER 2015 NEWSLETTER

It has been an exciting year. We have enjoyed the presence of young families and their energetic children. One member said that when the little ones leave the sanctuary, it seems half-empty! A good sign, I think.

This summer our youth covered 10 weeks of programming which saw an attendance total of 40 children spread over that time. We are encouraged that our families entrusted their children to us. Thank you to Becky and Grace Jeninga, Allison Robertson and Jaclyn McDougall for their efforts.

With the help of several people, the Laing Room was refurbished for the growing number of children, ages 3-5. Even with the summer humidity, we managed to complete the project. I appreciated the care and expertise that Braden Saunders brought to the job. He is following the footsteps of his great-grandfather who worked on the Christian Education wing in 1962.

The new program is off to a successful start under the capable leadership of Mary Jones. Mary is making use of the helpful site, ministry-to-children.com. Her years of experience as a primary teacher are paying off! Older children meet with Ruth Kerr to follow a more formalized curriculum based on the lectionary readings from "Seasons of the Spirit". We appreciate the assistance of Helen McDougall who is helping the classes to settle in, and the youth who continue to support us.

Our "Leading with Care" policy advises that two people are required in each room. We are working on how to implement this in our Nursery program. Thanks to the parents who are filling in, especially Adam Frybort, who has agreed to support these efforts. We know that the growth we are seeing now originated under the dedicated leadership of Mary Jones in the past.

Finally, we are considering how to use the offering that the children bring on a Sunday. One idea is to add our monetary support to the local churches' efforts to provide for Syrian refugee families. Any feedback is welcome.

Thank the Lord for this encouraging result. Our budget showed a downward trend, but thanks to your faithful contributions, including some large donations, our bank balance is higher than in the beginning of the year! Your support is very much appreciated.

Thank you to Bob Cleland and his faithful service for fund scrip. He presented the treasurer with a cheque for \$1000 in September. Please remember to start thinking of using the cards for your Christmas gifts. Order early in order to have them in good time.

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October, 2015

During this calendar year, we have spent a considerable amount of money and time working in the Boiler Room. In the church proper, we have been repairing small nuisance projects, IE, replacing the works on the washroom door which was not working properly, replacing a toilet in the upstairs ladies washroom as the unit was leaking, etc. Currently, we are fixing the indoor stair lights on each side of the front steps, resurfacing the communion table as it had two or three areas with water damage, etc. We thank John Hyma for replacing the broken roof drain pipe near the rear entrance. The conversion of the Lang room into a usable Sunday School room is a great accomplishment. These "little" projects soon add up in both time and money and are usually taken for granted as they are invisible until they become a problem. We are currently obtaining quotes on a good "spring cleaning" as the sanctuary walls and roof have not been cleaned for a considerable number of years. They need to be cleaned but what is a reasonable cost?

According to the analysis which our Treasurer, Henk, reported in the calendar on Sunday, October 11<sup>th</sup>, we have \$31,306 in the bank and owe \$12,000 to the manse fund. The congregation deserves a round of applause as this is a great position to be in. It must be noted that we are not on a mad spending spree. We are doing the things around the church that we need to support our congregational objectives and we should be quite proud of the work we have done this year. Well done folks.

The Boiler Room. In the spring, we approached the congregation and told them that we needed \$13,000 for repairs in the Boiler Room. Our subsequent campaign raised \$11,377 toward the project. We knew that when we started pulling things apart, we would probably find additional problems and we were not surprised when these items started popping up.

So far we have spent \$8,498.29 and we need to thank John and Jason Hyma for the work on the plumbing which saved us a bundle.

Upcoming are the following items (these amounts are educated guesses): the new electronic boiler controller (\$2500), emergency boiler disconnect (\$400), a new igniter switch for boiler one (\$200). Three of the boilers are overheating (\$3,000) but this one could become a big ticket item if the simple fixes do not work. We will know that next summer. We have shelved the re-piping of the exhaust system until we know the effect of the current changes.

Therefore, we are making progress in the Boiler Room and we believe we have a handle on the project.

Our congregation has decided to support the "Better Together" Refugee campaign which is going to bring several refugee families to our community. As a fundraiser for this campaign, on Saturday, November 14<sup>th</sup>, we will be hosting a concert by Matt Williams which will be a night of Country and Western music. This will be open to the public and tickets will cost \$15 per person. Tickets are available through the church, at 10,000 Villages and at Long & McQuade.

#### Heating System Rejuvenation Report Oct 15 2015

This past spring we talked about needing to do three things:

1. Install a second main circulation pump, a chemical feed system to deactivate the oxygen, and an air elimination device to remove air and gases from the circulation water:

This work was completed well within the estimated cost thanks to the generous volunteer work done by John Hyma and his son Jason.

2. Install a new electronic controller for the boilers:

This is a one day job to install and it can be done anytime. Bryan and John Baines are reviewing the specifications of the controller more thoroughly before ordering it.

3. Repair or replace three boilers that are not running well because they were overheating:

Two boilers (#4and #5) were modified to improve water flow through them and they no longer run hot. The third boiler (#1) runs hotter than we would like but appears acceptable from tests done in September. With the various changes done this summer we are now able to evaluate the performance of all boilers much more effectively than we ever could before. At this point we appear to have reasonable reliability in all boilers but further study this winter when the system operates at higher temperature is needed.

# **MISSION AND OUTREACH Branch:**

The Mission Branch met in early October. The group spent time discussing local mission opportunities for St. Andrew's to partner with, including Transition House, Fare Share and Neighbourlink. The team will be doing more work to discover who might be a natural fit for the congregation.

The team also articulated a desire to see support for St. Andrew's traditional mission partners continue. This includes working with Presbyterian World Service and Development (PWS&D) and Presbyterian Sharing. These two agencies are part of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and represent us in national and international mission projects.

Also discussed was the Better Together Refugee Sponsorship. St. Andrew's has agreed to join this initiative which represents many of the church's in Cobourg. Early in September eight members of St. Andrew's attended an information night about this project, resulting in two individuals volunteering to participate on the Core Teams which will work with the refugee families when they arrive in Canada.

Expect more updates on the Refugee projects and other ways that St. Andrew's can get involved with local mission projects in the near future.
