We have taken the initiative to continue physical improvements. For instance, the light bulbs in the Nursery have been changed to ones without any mercury content; the doorknobs in the washrooms

Finance and Operation Report

Heating System Rejuvenation Report

In April the Finance and Operations Committee presented an appeal for fund raising to deal with deficiencies in our boiler room. We need to do three things:

- Install a second main circulation pump
- Install a new electronic controller for the boilers
- Repair or replace three boilers that are not running well.

It is customary in large heating systems like ours to have two pumps connected in parallel so if one fails the other one can be started up quickly by the custodian. When the piping is being rearranged we have an opportunity to install a simple chemical feed system that will deactivate the oxygen and protect the boilers and church piping systems from rust in the future.

Presently our five boilers are started and stopped by an antiquated pneumatic control system that can only be serviced by one expert in Peterborough. We would like to replace it with a new electronic controller that can be serviced by a local contractor.

Three of our boilers produce a mixture of steam and hot water causing overheating inside the boilers. Under this condition we cannot expect them to run reliably for a long time. Over the next few months we must continue investigating the problems with guidance from the manufacturer and by hiring a service contractor. At this time we must also perform some routine servicing that is overdue.

We know our cost for installing the second main circulation pump, and the new boiler control and the chemical flush is \$13,000. The cost to deal with the boiler overheating problem is not yet known. We are ready to continue with the work this summer.

St. Andrew's Trustees



The Northumberland Hills Hospital Biggest Coffee Morning will celebrate and honour the lives of two local women and who made a significant difference in their communities.

The ninth annual fundraiser for the hospital was held on June 10 in memory of the Late Elaine Elliott, who built a quiet, yet powerful legacy of community involvement and support in Northumberland County; and Dorothy Allen, a Cobourg resident and outstanding volunteer, whose social influence touched many organizations.

In addition to working alongside her husband, Clay, to start and build Horizon Plastics, Ms. Elliot was a significant contributor of her time to the Northumberland Hills Hospital Auxiliary, Probus and Bridge Clubs, as well as founder of the Cobourg Inner Wheel.

The recipient of a Paul Harris Fellowship from the Rotary Club of Cobourg for her commitment to community support, Ms Dorothy Allen was also the recipient of a Town of Cobourg Mayor's Award of Distinction and a YMCA Peace Medal. A devoted and committed community builder and tireless volunteer, Ms. Allen supported organizations such as the YMCA, Kiwanis Club, Lawn Bowling Club, Probus Club of Cobourg, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church and the Northumberland Hills Hospital Auxiliary.

Coffee Morning Fast Facts:

- Any business, organization or individual can organize a coffee morning. Hosts provide coffee, cake or any other creative party idea and guests made a donation to the NHH Foundation.
- The annual coffee morning has raised more than \$375,600 for hospital medical equipment since it began in 2007.
- Funding for medical equipment must come from donations as funds from the government cover operating costs only.
- Participation in the event helps ensure that doctors, nurses and staff have access to up-to-date medical equipment, to continue to provide the highest quality health-care services possible in the community.

We have also learned about other health topics or concerns for seniors in today's society. We have pot luck lunches several times a year. Everyone is welcome to join us.

Bible Study: Theology of Atonement

In weeks after Easter a group of just under twenty individuals have been gathering on Wednesday morning to study the Theology of Atonement. This is a central theology in Christian faith as it considers what exactly happened on Good Friday and Easter Sunday. We confess that we are saved from our sin through Christ's death on the cross. What our study did was ask the question, how does Jesus' death save us?

During the study we considered several questions:

- Who is Jesus?
- Why did he die?
- Why does it matter?
- What is sin?
- What role do I, or does humanity, play in atonement theories?

The study considered historic and modern positions on atonement, such as Ransom Theory, Satisfaction Theory, Moral Influence, Christus Victor, Penal Substitionary Atonement, Feminist Positions and several other modern theories. Each week the study began by listening to a hymn and asking how that hymn spoke about the atonement.

Thank you to all who participated in this study. Each individual brought their own perspective and questions, enriching the discussion. It was a lot of reading, but I hope well worthwhile.

In the fall we begin a five week study on Philip Yancey's book *Vanishing Grace*. I hope to see you there.

What is Rev. Ellis Reading?

I am currently reading two books on leadership. The first is *Choosing Change: How to motivate churches to face the future* by Rev. Dr. Peter Coutts. Coutts is a Presbyterian minister who now works as a congregational consultant in Southern Alberta. This book came recommended as a good book to read during the first year of ministry.

The second book is *A Failure of Nerve: Leadership in the Age of the Quick Fix* by the late Edwin H. Friedman. This book was not finished before Friedman passed away, but his family understood the importance of his work and with the assistance of his editor 'put the pieces together' to finish it.

After these books are finished I will turn to *Reading the Bible Again for the First* Time by the late Marcus Borg. This book has been sitting on my shelf unread for too long. Following this I will be reading *Vanishing Grace* by Philip Yancey in preparation for the Fall Bible Study.

If there is a subject area about the church or faith that you are interested in, please ask. If I have a book that will be helpful I will gladly lend it out. If not, I will try to point you in the direction of a good read.

Partnering with SONG is one of the ways that St. Andrew's continues to be a vital place in the life of Cobourg. Our sanctuary became a place of refuge and peace where family could gather and celebrate together through music.
